**Sources:** Monthly news magazines (The Atlantic, Harper's); more specialized magazines, news outlets, social media, and online sources **Information:** Investigative reporting; early analysis; in-depth background research and information; effort to understand the "why" and "how"; more specialized experts are consulted; emergence of a "bigger picture" of event; deepening understanding of larger causes and long-term consequences

**Sources:** Scholarly books and articles; deeply researched and carefully vetted publications; reports from highly regarded institutions; government publications **Informaton:** In-depth analysis by variety of highly specialized experts; massive amounts of data; debate moves from immediate event to issues of prevention, solutions, systemic problems; event is put into larger historical, social, political, scientific contexts

Decades

**Sources:** Scholarly books and articles continue; trade books/popular press books; government publications Wikipedia pages; encyclopedia entries; reference books; textbooks **Information:** Analysis continues in books and scholarly sources as new information and data are discovered; narrative of event solidifies as reference sources summarize key points, people, and developments
